Charles and Millie McGregor celebrate 75th anniversary

Charles and Millie McGregor were raised in the same general area of rural Kansas. When both attended school in South Haven, KS., they met and dated, marrying on February 8th, 1941. When Hitler's war clouds were in Europe, Charles was drafted in July, 1941, and he served at Ft. Eustis, Ft. Meade, and Camp Shanks in New York, from where he got orders to go to England. Millie returned home to live with her parents; their first child was born the day after Charles left. He was not able to see his daughter until she was eighteen months old.

Charles was injured during training in England, rupturing two discs, doctors did-



give him much pain relief. They were guarding trains from Marseille, France when they got word of Germany's surrender.

Millie's father had planted wheat for them and they paid all the expenses, receiving the money for the crop. After being home and trying to rent additional land, Charles took jobs for income but found he couldn't hold a job due to his bad back. Later, a doctor in Wichita said he could

make his back strong by fusing 2 vertebrae; the operation was fairly successful for a while.


When Millie's father died, they took over the land- about 310 acres. They were farmers for a way of life. They Raised four wonderful daughters on the farm and now have 22 grandchildren and 27 greatgrandchildren. They celebrated their 75th wedding anniversary February 8th.

Back to Bradford Village

Jeanne Peterson was born in 1923 in Wichita Falls, TX. To A.C. and Ethel Walker, their 3rd child. Her father worked in the oil business, which caused the family to move to West Texas when she was twelve.

She graduated from high school in 1940 and attended Southwestern University in Georgetown, TX. WWII began in 1941, causing her to quit college to serve the war effort. In 1942, she moved to Cor-

pus Christi, TX and went to work for Halliburton, where she met and married John Porter Peterson, Jr. on October 19th, 1946. When transferred, they moved to Flora, Illinois where Steven, their first child, was born in 1950. The family moved to Halliburton headquarters in Duncan, OK., where Patricia was born in 1953.

When the children left for college and her husband retired, Jeanne



opened a gift shop, La Hacienda, which she ran for 20 years. Mr. Peterson died in 1989; Jeanne sold the gift shop and followed the mission field of the United Methodist Church. She traveled in the United States, then went to England, Jamaica, Mexico and Israel, doing mission work. She also worked in the Kairos Prison Ministry, working with women in prison.

In 2003 she moved to Edmond to be near her son. She lived in a Bradford Village cottage for two years where she began an excerise program 3 days a week, Known as the Sockettes. She continued to lead the Sockettes when she moved to an apartment nearby in 2005.

A fall in 2015 made it necessary for her to move to Bradford Village Health Care Center, where she plans to spend the rest of her earthly life. Trish, her daughter, make the remark: "You finally got back to Bradford Village until the Lord calls you home".

Jeanne lives by God's word, doing God's will, believes in laughing a lot, and always thinks of others.
