Marilyn Hunt Shares Memories of a Wonderful Life!

Marilyn was raised in Oklahoma City and graduated from Central High School. Though her parents divorced when she was months he was gone. two (and she never knew her father) she felt very loved by her mother and grandparents. Upon graduating from high school she took a secretarial course and began working at a finance company in the Hightower building. She met the boss' son and they fell in love. She remained working while he attended West Point Military Academy for four years. When he graduated in June, 1950, they had a traditional wedding in the chapel at West Point. He was


posted to Korea just a month after the wedding; she lived with her mother and step-father during the sixteen

As a member of the Corps of Engineers, the family moved often. They went to Missouri when he returned from Korea and their first child was born. Next, they went to University of Illinois, where their son was born. They spent 3 1/2 years in Germany, where their last daughter was born; they raised their children mainly in Alexandria, Virginia. They also lived in Ft. Leavenworth, Kansas and spent three years in New Orleans where he worked as the District Engineer involved in

flood-control on the Mississippi River. They enjoyed four vears living in the Canal Zone in Panama (see related story about "Panama.") He retired in 1978 and the couple returned to Oklahoma City, where he worked for three years for an architectural/ engineering firm. They celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary during those years.

Marilyn and her husband were active members of New Covenant Christian Church. She also helped with Meals on Wheels.

Marilyn Hunt lives at 301 Spence Court in a



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home her late husband helped design. He was careful to include details to make it comfortable for her, though he didn't survive to share it. The house is beautifully furnished with many objects collected at their postings during his career in the Army Corps of Engineers.

"We have been very lucky in life," Marilyn asserts. What a lovely evaluation of a busy and full life!

"Panama"



Those residents who have interacted with their mailman, Hubert Hammon, have found him very personable. "Panama" is his commonly-used name; others who call him Bert or even Hubert are answered with blank stares of incomprehension.

Panama was born in the Canal Zone in the American hospital there, while the Canal Zone was still legally considered American soil. He holds dual citizenship in the U.S. and Panama, since his father was from Pawhuska, Oklahoma and his mother was from Panama. He attended the American school on the base; they lived in base housing. That was where he met Shari and Sue, Marilyn Hunt's daughters, as classmates.

"It was like paradise," Panama reports of life in Panama in those days. The safe living on base led to days of riding bikes, playing soccer and generally freedom-

filled days. They had American hospitals, good schools, a court system, the commissary and other advantages living on base. "Everyone loved Americans when I was a child" Panama exclaimed.

The family moved to New York in 1977 and Panama contacted Shari, the older daughter of Marilyn Hunt, a classmate in Panama, for information about Edmond and Central State College (later UCO). He enrolled in Central, and expected to be offered a soccer scholarship, only to find out that Oklahomans didn't play soccer at that time. He decided to stay in Edmond and has remained almost 40 years!

Most of the time in Edmond, he has served as a U.S. mail carrier. One day, when delivering mail to Oklahoma Christian Home (today's Bradford Village Healthcare), he encountered Sue Perry, Marilyn's younger daughter. That led to a reunion with the entire family. Later, while working as a substitute on the Bradford Village route, he knocked on Marilyn's door—another reunion!

Panama is knowledgeable about his first homeland and remembers well when President Carter turned the American facilities in the Canal over to Panama in 1998. He still has family there and both of his parents have been buried there. Living conditions have deteriorated there, with personal safety being a major problem in today's Panama. As a single father, he is glad to have raised his three children in America.


Bradford Village Book Club Choices
