Apricot White-Chocolate Cookies

There were several requests for the recipe for the apricot cookies served at the Adel's Christmas shower.

- 6 oz. package dried apricots
- 1 package white cake mix
- 12 oz. package white chocolate chips
- ◆ 2 eggs
- 2/3 c. butter

Using a pair of kitchen shears, snip the apricots into small pieces and set them aside.

Mix together the cake mix, eggs, and butter. Stir in the apricots and white chocolate chips. Drop by teaspoons full onto a lightly-greased cookie sheet.

Bake the cookies for about 12 minutes at 350 degrees. It's not necessary to frost them, but they look more festive when frosted with a simple buttercream frosting (powdered sugar/butter/milk icing).
