Jeanie Maynard



Born and raised in Glasgow, Scotland, Jeanie Maynard's life has spanned two continents and different cultures. Jeanie's childhood was a struggle; she was six years old her when her mother died, leaving her and five siblings dependent on her granny; her overwhelmed father moved away, and Jeanie did not see her father again for eight years.

Granny was very strict with the children, but the children often fended for themselves as their grandmother struggled with alcohol abuse. As a result, one brother joined the merchant marines and another chose to move in with his father and step-mother. As the oldest remaining girl, Jeanie became the "little mom" and protector of the younger children. When Jeanie

was twelve, the opportunity to live with a good friend (who was being raised by *her* grandmother) arose, and the friend's grandmother became Jeanie's guardian. The grandparents died, and Jeanie and her friend were taken in by a downstairs neighbor. To pay her part of the rent, Jeanie went to work in a whiskey distillery, working there for five years. To this day, Jeanie still doesn't like the smell of whiskey!

At age twenty-one, upon the death of her landlord, she and a friend decided to come to America. The two girls found the way to get to America was to answer an advertisement for a nanny service. In return for passage to America, each girl agreed to work for their employer at least one year. Jeanie went to Baltimore, Maryland, while her friend settled in New Jersey.

Jeanie had worked in Baltimore for a few years when she was invited on a blind date with a Navy man. Glen Maynard and Jeanie courted for only three months, whereupon they married. Jeanie came to Yukon, Oklahoma, to live with Glen's parents until he could be discharged from the Navy. In 1964, they settled into a home in Yukon, and Glen began working at General Electric in Oklahoma City. Jeanie was a stay-at-home mother to their children, Angela and John.

Angela remains in Yukon and has two sons. John lives and teaches school in Edmond and has eight children.

Two years ago, Jeanie had a stroke and move to the Bradford Village healthcare center. You may have seen her recently in *Broadway Hits: A Year in Revue*! Her best friend and husband, Glen, is very attentive, coming every day from Yukon to spend time with her. You can often see them on nice days sitting together in the garden area of the healthcare center. They have been married 54 years.

John Boaz

John Boaz was born in 1934 in Drayton Plains, Michigan, where he remained through high school. John participated in many sporting events, including hockey, soccer, football, calisthenics, and boxing (he held the school record for doing situps for 20 minutes!) He started working at a young age, including work in construction, roofing, and at a gas station.



Bethel College in Mackenzie, Tennessee was John's first experience in college; he then attended Central Michigan, where he decided to become a Disciples of Christ minister. He earned his bachelor's degree at Butler University in Indianapolis, Indiana. While in his senior year at Butler, he met Dorothy, who became his wife. In two month's span, he graduated from college, terminated his 1-1/2 year position as a youth minister at Seventh Christian Church, entered seminary, was hired as a pastor by his first church, and married Dorothy. He prepared for his life as a minister at Christian University Theological Seminary, also in Indianapolis. Upon graduation, he served as minister in St. Paul, Indiana; Battle Creek, Michigan; and Overland, Missouri, for a total of 23 years. His favorite part of the ministry was having a one-to-one relationship with people.

When he was 45 years old, John had his first stroke, which incapacitated him. A second stroke took the sight in his right eye, and macular degeneration caused him to lose the sight in his left eye a few years later. The couple moved to Enid, Oklahoma, where Dorothy managed the Oklahoma Meadowview Apartments—owned by the Christian Church—for 15 years.

The Boaz's have three children and four grandchildren. Their son lives in Edmond, as does one of their daughters. Their other daughter lives in Chicago.

When Dorothy retired from Meadowview, the couple decided to move to a cottage at Bradford Village, where they lived for several years. Both are now making their home at the Assisted Living. John actively participates in AL living by working out every morning and attending weekly chapel services. You'll also find him at The Great Courses and Fireside Chats. John was The Phantom in *The Phantom of the Opera* and a rebel in *Les Misérables* in the recent production of *Broadway Hits: A Year in Revue*.

John says: "I think gratitude is the grounds for living, and I'm thankful to God for living."



Working as an aide for hospice helped her see how the teams worked together for the benefit of the patients and their families. It also sharpened her appreciation of life and death. Platte College helped her have the credentials to be a nurse, but Scott Baker, fellow nurse at the Bradford Village health care center, really taught her how to do the job correctly. She credits Scott for much of her success.

Nyoka has worked other jobs in addition to health care. She was an insurance adjuster, licensed in 30 states, and also took classes in financial information, gaining training in estate planning and loans. She has worked at Bradford for three years, but also works at an agency as a nurse. Keeping two avenues open as been a plan all her life, to forestall failure.

With her leisure time, she enjoys reading, gardening, and being outside, especially at the fishing hole! She is an avid fan of OKC Thunder, OU sports, and the Dallas Cowboys. On April 1st, 1957, Oklahoma Christian Home opened its doors for business and 60 years later, now known as Bradford Village, we will be celebrating this historic milestone. Not many businesses can claim to have been around for 60 years but we can claim that as our own. Over the years, of course, Bradford Village has expanded the original nursing home to nearly double in size, and added 78 cottages, 44 assisted living apartments, a Community Center and Activity Center.

Most of you probably remember some of these facts but in 1957, Dwight Eisenhower was President. The Soviet Union launched Sputnik. The Milwaukee Braves won the World Series in baseball. Bobby Fisher became the chess champion at age 13. Movies such as *The Bridge over the River Kwai* and *Love in the Afternoon* came out in theaters. Songs like "Wake Up Little Susie" and "Jailhouse Rock" played on the airwaves. In 1957, the average yearly wage was \$4,555. 28 is what it cost for a gallon of gas. A pound of bacon was 60 cents and a dozen eggs would cost you 28 cents. Lastly, the stock market was trading at 436 (as of this writing it is trading at 20,808).

A lot has changed in the country since 1957 but one thing remains constant—the care provided at Bradford Village. And as long I'm here, that will never change. We have also gone through a lot of changes here on campus in the 60 years we've been around. I tried to locate the number of Edmond businesses that have failed since 1957 but the number must be so high it cannot be tracked. I would venture the number to be astonishing. 60 years in the health care industry is a remarkable feat and one that we are going to celebrate. And it is all of you that make this possible.

We will be celebrating this milestone the week leading up to April 1st. Be looking for information to come out and our week will end with a campus wide party on the afternoon of Friday, March 31st as we host an open house across the campus; the Elderly Brothers will be performing at the Health Care Center and much more. We look forward to celebrating the first 60 years and what the future holds for Bradford Village.
