## **Genny Adamson**





Genny Adamson lived in 22 different homes before moving to Bradford Village as an independent cottager in 2000, and later chose a prime corner-room at the Assisted Living in 2015. She loves the sunshine that streams through the large window frames and has found contentment in the activities offered by living there, especially those that stimulate her mind. She reads three different newspapers daily, is a great listener and really enjoys peoplewatching.

Topeka, KS was the place of her birth, but the family soon moved to Wichita, KS, where she remained through high school. Her mother suffered from schizophrenia and was frequently hospitalized, but Genny remembers her as being a quiet, good mother when she was home. Her parents divorced. but her father remained in their lives and supported the family well.

Genny married soon after World War II began and had a son; five years later their daughter was born. Her son later married and had two sons. He was a chiropractor, but died at 37 due to leukemia. Patricia, her daughter, lives in New York City and is a retired opera singer, who performed with many famous tenors and baritones.

You can listen to recordings of her singing on You-Tube (search for Patricia Wise). Pat no longer performs, but she is sought out by professional operatic singers for private coaching. She has a daughter. Genny's late son's children have provided two grandchildren living in Bristow, OK.

A friend who was a librarian encouraged Genny to enter the field. She found much satisfaction in that work, since she loves to read and enjoys meeting people. She worked diligently with the Edmond Chamber of Commerce to convince the Oklahoma County Public Library to locate a branch in Edmond, which she served as Head Librarian. She is proud to say that it quickly became the most active in circulation in all of Oklahoma County. While serving as a librarian, Genny also found time to participate in DAR, PEO, Cambridge Society, and became active in the First Christian Church of Edmond.

"Good things come out of bad things" and "Accept any positives you have to give and give them away" were two phrases Genny has used to guide her life.

# **Madge Cockrum**



Madge Cockrum was born in a two room house in rural Illinois. When she was in 4th grade, they moved to a town of 450 residents about 20 miles from St. Louis. She is an only child, and the only girl in her class until high school. She graduated in a class of five, two girls and three boys. Until she was 12, Madge was the only grandchild in the family.

Grandparents held a big role in her life; both spoiled her. When she was a young girl, she wrote to her grandfather and told him that she wanted a pony. It was agreed that the grandfather would

buy it, and her father would buy the feed! She rode the pony to school with all the school children taking turns during recess to ride the pony. As a high school graduation gift, her grandmother and Madge went to Chicago. They boarded a lake steamer to ports in Canada and the U.S., landing in Buffalo, N.Y. The two traveled by train to New York City, where they climbed to the top of the torch held by the Statue of Liberty. The trip included a stop in Washington, D.C., where her favorite memory was visiting the Lincoln Memorial.

Southern Illinois University offered her a scholarship, and there she soon met the man who became her husband. Her roommate introduced them; Madge returned the favor by introducing the roommate to the man who became *her* husband! Ernest and Madge were married for 47 years. He was in the army during the Korean Conflict, serving state side. After he returned, they moved to Madge's hometown and purchased a chicken farm with 1,000 laying hens, whose eggs she collected and sold to the local grocer. After four years on the farm, Ernest got a job as a salesman for a fertilizer company, where he quickly rose to be the top salesman. That led to their moving often; they lived in eight states. Madge worked at a drugstore and her boss sent her to Chicago to become a cosmetics representative. She also sold Avon.

The Cockrums had three children; she has a living son and daughter. She is the proud grand-mother of five grandchildren. Her granddaughter is an attorney in Washington, D.C., and her grandson is a mechanical engineer. Of the other three, one is in computers, one is a Lutheran minister, and one is a salesman. She has one great-grandson and another on the way. Madge and Ernest moved to Oklahoma to be closer to their family. Madge was widowed in 2000 and moved into the Bradford Village Healthcare Center in 2010.

St. Louis Cardinals baseball is Madge's favorite team, but she also enjoys watching basketball and football; she used to play golf. She attends church weekly with her daughter. She's traveled to England, Ireland, Italy, Greece, and all states but Alaska. She collects angel figurines—she's even crocheted some—and crosses. She made afghans "for everyone!" She enjoyed playing the piano, a skill she learned as a child. She also played the clarinet in school and all her children are musical.

Madge's closing remarks were: "I like to be neighborly and see lots of beauty in the sky."

He was retired from being employed by Southwestern Bell and they enjoyed traveling widely with the Telephone Pioneers. George was a diabetic, and he ate well and exercised faithfully, but he was later diagnosed with Parkinson's. After an eight-month illness, he passed away in June, 2016. They had enjoyed 16 years of marriage.

Winnie is anticipating entertaining in her lovely cottage.


