Gary was born in Hubbard Hospital in Oklahoma City long since closed. He had no sisters



or brothers. Britton Elementary was his early childhood school, but he graduated from Edmond High School, back when it was the building on Ninth Street and Rankin. He graduated in 1965 and went to work for the OKC Golf and Country Club in the kitchen. Detailing cars for Morris Chevrolet and working at the **Quality Inn Hotel** coffee shop were other short-term jobs. He worked the

longest - 34 years! – at the FAA Hanger, beginning in the paint shop and moving on to the mail room. He delivered mail, memorizing routes. He also worked in the printing department, printing and loading papers. When casing letters (placing them in mail slots) he once worked alone to distribute 13,000 letters in one day! (The other helper was out that day.) He also worked at the local McDonald's for 3-4 years, as well as Walmart and Target.

Having diabetes for the last fourteen years has slowed Gary down, but he says it is currently under pretty good control.

The Briney family were charter members of Southern Hills Christian Church and Gary was active there until last year, when he moved his membership to the First Christian Church. He is hoping to begin working as a greeter there, as it was his main job at Southern Hills.

Gary is thankful to be living at Bradford Village and reports, "Everyone is so nice!"

"The heavens declare the Glory of God and the firmament showeth His handiwork." - KJV



VILLAGERS AND VOLUNTEERISM

Recently, a group of four Villagers, spearheaded by Verniece Johnson, visited Little Light Christian School, a private school for Oklahoma children with a parent who was or is now incarcerated. Verniece's daughter has been a volunteer at Little Light and is now a teacher there. Others making that first trip included Willa Love, Mary Davidson, and Mary Quisenberry. A brief report of this visit was presented to the Executive Committee by Mary Quisenberry, and, as a result, over \$500.00 in cash and personal checks was donated to the school. This amount included a check from Bradford Village by Eric Legleiter.

The school recently moved into a 9-acre facility at 3301 N. MLK, which was made possible through a donation from the Jasco Giving Hope Foundation. The new school campus includes five buildings, a basketball court, playground, and physical education building. The property is about 50 years old and formerly housed a program for children with autism and before that, once was the site of an orphanage.

Another group of Villagers, which included Jeanne Kuhlman, Kathy and Lou Meszaros, and Mary Quisenberry, toured the facility on November 2, and enjoyed a brief program presented by the students and comments by the school's founder and principal, Robin Khoury.

If other Bradford Village residents are interested in tours, reservations are required and may be made directly by calling 475-0585. The tours begin promptly at 11:30, conclude by 12:30, and include a light lunch. Volunteers at the school may serve as a Reading Buddy. Financial contributions support the clothing fund, the library fund, or the food pantry.
