Her parents were school teachers, then built and owned a 1000-seat motion picture show in Pryor, Oklahoma (who was experiencing boom days due to the importance of the powder plant). They sold the theaters in 1951 and built the NE 66 Drive-In Theater at the Lincoln Park area.

Lee graduated from the University of Tulsa and spendt two summers attending Northwestern University in Illinois pursuing her interest in theater. She moved to Oklahoma City to help her parents at the drive-in theater and worked at a UHF television station where she had a fifteen-minute interview program three times a week. Lee also attended a business school during that time where she met her husband Jerry Reeder.

Jerry's career was serving as a CPA with the U. S. General Accounting Office. The couple had four children, and when the youngest was seven years old, they moved from OKC to Edmond. Ellen, their first child, is the author of "Dust Bowl Girls", a book the Bradford Village Book Club recently read




CHAPLAIN'S CORNER
